

CAHRD provides education and training through three programs.

• NEEGINAN LEARNING & LITERACY CENTRE


The Learning Centre provides instruction in language arts, numeracy, science, social science and computers. This program also focuses on personal development and community involvement.

This year 79 students moved from literacy to upgrading at the Aboriginal Community Campus.



ABORIGINAL COMMUNITY CAMPUS

A stand-alone Adult Learning Centre that provides a holistic and welcoming learning environment, focused on student needs and development. Everyone who attends ACC will be assisted to reach their individual education goals.



EDUCATION AND TRAINING


• NEEGINAN COLLEGE OF APPLIED TECHNOLOGY

We offer skills and technology training to the Indigenous community of Winnipeg. We train on the art facilities and equipment, work closely with employers ensuring students are prepared to enter the workforce in high-demand industries.

KOOKUM'S PLACE DAYCARE

Provides child care for students attending CAHRD's education and training programs. At Kookum's Place, each child's journey is treated with respect, appreciating their cultural background, community and individuality.

Kookum's Place Daycare offers two (2) fully subsidized on-site daycare centres for its students.

1.Kookum's Infant Centre – 42 infants from 1 week to 2 years of age

2. Kookum's Preschool Centre - 80 ages 2-5 years of age

NEEGINAN VILLAGE

CAHRD's student housing focuses on building community by providing safe and affordable housing for students attending education and training programs; and is fully subsidized through Manitoba Housing.



EMPLOYMENT SERVICES


CAHRD provides Employment Services through 2 divisions to ensure Indigenous people become employed in good-paying jobs:

EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

Employment Services assists Indigenous clients to find employment and/or enter education and training programs by creating an action plan to successfully attain stated goals. Employment Counsellors offer career exploration options, referrals to employment, education and training, and job search strategies.

STAFFING SOLUTIONS

Staffing Solutions offers services to recent Indigenous graduates and people who are ready for skilled and/or professional careers to help them find successful employment. Assistance is customized to individual client needs which includes liaison with employers to ensure a positive employment outcome.





EXTERNAL PROJECTS (SUB-AGREEMENTS)

A CAHRD Program that is committed to working in partnership with the community, industry, institutions and all levels of Government, to enable urban Indigenous people to overcome employment barriers, pursue lifelong learning, and engage in rewarding employment and career opportunities.




OTHER PROJECTS


MOTHER EARTH RECYCLING

SKILLS AND PARTNERSHIP FUND


